standardized evaluation systems. This system is intended to provide accountability. We are told the assessments will help measure and rank our students, teachers, schools and district. However, we know that we don't need a national test to assess our effectiveness. Clearly, we understand that student progress monitoring has value. For years, we have used local assessments, classroom data and curriculum to guide instruction and meet the learning needs of our students. Measurements and accountability are not new concepts. However, when that is accomplished with high-stakes testing and a national standardization, you expend an inordinate amount of time, energy and anxiety on the wrong things.

Helping students succeed is our priority at Garaway. Developing a love for learning is our priority. Inspiring and innovating is our priority. We understand that every student is special and possesses a variety of talents and skills. Incidentally, most of those unique qualities and skills cannot be measured on a single, standardized assessment.

At Garaway Local Schools we want our students to be involved in an array of activities. We want them to learn how to be relational, creative and critical thinkers. As tension and concerns rise over standards, testing and student opt-outs, we cannot overemphasize the importance of parental and community engagement. We need to find a way to be unified at this critical juncture in education. We

TREASURER'S NOTE

The Garaway School District passed a significant milestone in December, 2014, by making the final payment on a \$2.2 million in bond debt for the construction of additional high school classrooms, gymnasium, and locker rooms that have been a liability to the District since 1990. With the bond officially retired, the District has joined a select group of school districts in the state of Ohio, and the only District in Tuscarawas County with no bonded debt. Being free of long-term debt is a powerful statement about fiscal responsibility, and the credit belongs to the citizens of the Garaway School District who approved the School Improvement Bond in 1990. This places the District on solid footing to meet the future.

CURRICULUM DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Next year, Garaway High School will be offering new opportunities to students through College Credit Plus and Fuel Education. Ohio is expanding their dual enrollment program through College Credit Plus. Many of us are aware of post secondary options in the past where students left Garaway to attend Kent State Tusc. By doing this in high school, the student received high school credit along.

the student received high school credit along with college credit. The biggest change to College Credit Plus is that students may now stay at Garaway while taking college classes. We are working with Stark State to bring English, Math and Social Studies classes along with several electives to our school. Classes will be taught by Garaway teachers who are credentialed to be adjunct professors. There is no cost to the students to participate in these classes and they can earn dual credits.

Fuel education partners with schools and districts to personalize learning. They provide innovative digital learning solutions for pre–K through 12th grade that empower districts to implement and grow successful online and blended learning programs. We look forward to using Fuel Ed as a curriculum tool in many ways. It will provide our teachers another tool to use in the classroom. It will provide students the opportunity to take classes we do not offer at Garaway by enrolling in an online class and it will provide students who desire a more flexible schedule or setting that opportunity.

We are in the planning stages to roll these programs out this spring as we plan for next year. We do know the programs will open many more opportunities for our students in the line of curriculum which is exciting and beneficial. If you have specific questions, please do not hesitate to ask.
