

AT THE HELM: SUPERINTENDENT'S NOTE

The limited condition of Ohio school funding creates challenges that are difficult for school districts. Essentially, revenue has been decreasing or remaining stagnate while inflation has increased necessary operating expenses. However, those growing challenges can be conquered with sufficient dedication, creativity and teamwork. Above all, success with these impediments stems from a belief in the importance of our students and community. I am proud of the collaboration, ingenuity and accomplishments that were achieved at Garaway Schools this year. Moreover, we are thankful for the people that supported those efforts.

At this point in our school year, It is a great time to look back at some of the accomplishments from 2015/2016. Through the acquisition of grant money, our 7-12 building completed an extensive upgrade in security. Also, through grant funds, donations and benevolent contributors, Baltic Elementary is transforming their library into a vibrant multimedia center and space to enjoy reading and learning. Additionally, Baltic Elementary was able to replace many classroom windows through a community gift. Local efforts and consideration also allowed Ragersville Elementary to complete a flooring project. Furthermore, the Rotary Foundation provided funding for digital tablets to be used by our elementary students. They are also hoping to fund a new digital sign in front of our 7-12 building in order to effectively keep our community informed of upcoming events. Furthermore, each of our buildings received landscaping attention and upgrades through an army of community volunteers.

Looking ahead in 2016, we are working to partner with Paradise Energy to help our students learn more about alternative energy sources and reduce our current electric expenditures. This project will fund solar panels on the roof of the Garaway Belden Center. Ultimately, the district will save a significant amount on annual energy expenses for that building while simultaneously allowing students to monitor and learn throughout this entire process. We are also finalists for a \$10,000,000 school improvement grant. We have been working hard to obtain this grant from the XQ Super School Project. Lastly, through the help of community support, we will be working on upgrades for Miller Avenue Elementary and Dundee Elementary.

We are grateful for the support from our communities. Without your help, it would be difficult to provide an excellent, safe and inspiring place to learn and grow. We desire to make our community strong and proud. If you would like to get connected, please consider volunteering or joining a committee. We have an ongoing Facility Committee, Finance Committee and Curriculum Committee and we welcome your involvement.

IN THE COFFER: TREASURER'S NOTE

FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

As the Garaway Local School District Board of Education is statutorily required to deliver educational programs and services to the school children and is responsible to the community including taxpayers, parents, and other patrons to ensure an effective, vibrant, and productive education system, they have authorized the District Superintendent and Treasurer to symbolically invoice the Governor of the State of Ohio and the Ohio Department of Education \$1.9 Million dollars that the Garaway District has lost since fiscal year 2002 to charters, which are privately run public schools in the state. An invoice asking for payment in full, based on figures compiled by the Treasurer's office, will be sent along with the Resolution.

These figures were taken as a deduction from the state foundation funding under the district's budget line-item "Community Schools" payments from fiscal years 2002 to 2016.

The state foundation budget formula, which has evolved over the years, takes into consideration, local and state contributions. The Ohio Department of Education determines the budget formula, which includes the contributions to the community schools based on Ohio law. Semimonthly, the District receives money from the Ohio Department of Education for operation – along with the deduction for students attending charter/community schools. With only two charter schools in Tuscarawas County, the majority of the money diverted from Garaway is spread throughout the state to places like Columbus, Cincinnati, Akron, Cleveland, and Toledo, to name a few of cities where large charters operate.

The money not received from the state has cost Garaway students class offerings, teachers, educational support and enrichment opportunities, as well as other services. The loss of this money has cost the local taxpayer additional money by having to subsidize monies lost to the charter school industry in the form of additional tax levies.

The Board is aware that likelihood the district will receive such a sum from the state is slim to none, but they believe they must take the stand on behalf of taxpayers, who may not know how the diversion of funding to charter schools has affected local districts.



Public school districts use a combination of state funds, local sources such as property taxes (and in some cases income taxes) and federal funds.

The amount of state funds that a district receives is based on a formula that takes into account student enrollment and the property wealth of the district.

GARAWAY LOCAL SCHOOLS RECEIVES AUDITOR OF STATE AWARD

A recent financial audit of Garaway Local Schools for the year ending June 30, 2015 (FY2015) by the Auditor of State Dave Yost's office has returned a clean audit report. Garaway's excellent record keeping has earned it the *Auditor of State Award*.

These classes will start next year and present an opportunity for a student to sit in either an English and/or Math class prior to entering their own scheduled class.
